Tribstrokes

It took a little extra time for golf weather to arrive in the Midlands this year, but it appears that we may be able to enjoy the links in uninterrupted fashion for the rest of the season. The current rains created a momentary pause in play, but all three Hastings courses have greened up considerably in the past couple of days. When the sun comes out, I'm afraid a lot of employers may find their golfing help looking pretty longingly out the windows, or maybe even developing a sick aunt or two.

The girls are getting all set for the season ahead. Meadowbrook's ladies had their first meeting Thursday morning, and Southern Hills and Lochland gals will start on Tuesday. The men are pretty well under way at all three clubs, according to reports we've gotten.

Golfers always love to argue about the relative difficulty of holes and courses. It used to be that such an argument could be settled by appealing to the USGA's rating book, which listed the number of strokes a really good player would be expected to take on a hole. Thus one three par might be rated 2.8, while another could be a 3.7 hole, which would be an extremely difficult one.

BASED ON LENGTH

But now I'm told the rating is based only on the hole's length, and that won't help settle any debates about the real tough ones.

A fellow from Omaha has been poking around the state trying to determine which is the hardest hole in Nebraska. And, to the surprise of hardly anybody, has decided that Lochland's 18th has to be pretty close.

"The Monster," familiar to anybody who has played the layout, is described by Lochland pro Bud Williamson as a "driving hole." "Hit a good drive," says Bud, "and the hole isn't too tough, but otherwise you can disappear."

POPULAR PLACE

Williamson reports that he pulls some one thousand balls per month out of the pond, so there are plenty of people who have their troubles. The clincher is that Lochland's rules don't provide for a drop across the drink—you have to keep slugging until you get a ball that will carry the 175 yard or so minimum distance.

One Lochland member brags about hitting 11 balls into the lake in one round. The most strokes Williamson can recall a pro taking was 12—a figure racked up by Ron Guina, a Scottsbluff swinger in 1967. He put four balls into the drink.

There's no way to prove that "the Monster" is the toughest hole in the state, or even in the country, but it might well be the most expensive for the golfer.

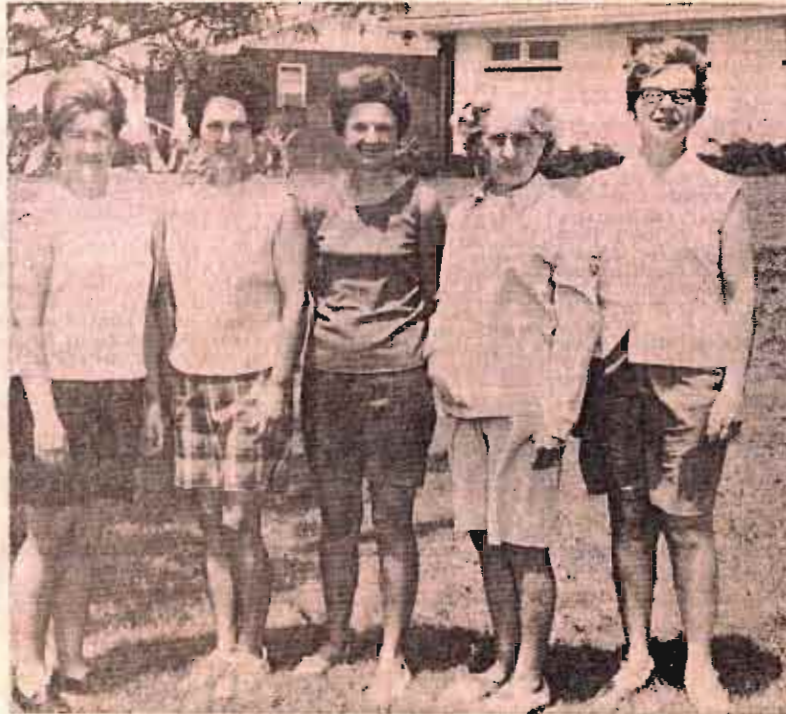
