Elise Friend noted that Tuesday's windy conditions gave her a rough time.

"I had a tough time in the wind. It was hard to keep the ball in play. But, I was happy that I didn't have any out-of-bounds," Friend said.

Unseated champion Naomi Thiel lauded Friend's efforts saying she played consistently well. Thiel appraised her own performance by saying that after she settled down from the qualifying round her playing became better in the tournament.

Karen Tegler, who had been tied with Thiel going into Tuesday's round, didn't think the weather hindered her play.

Lawrence's Elsie Karmazin battled a seven-stroke margin for her president's flight win and believed that she did much better than expected. She also felt that the wind didn't help her play, but overall she was satisfied with her performance.

Susie Moffatt placed fourth in the championship flight with a 238, but distinguished herself with a first time hole-in-one on the No. 6 hole at Southern Hills Friday.

LINCOLN (AP) — Columbus' Cathy Curry won the first hole of a sudden-death playoff to capture her second straight State Nebraska Women's Amateur Golf Association State medal play championship Wednesday.

Hastings native Jim White had a record-breaking homecoming with Sunday's victory in the 9th Annual Midwest Golf Classic.

The Council Bluffs professional toured Lochland Country Club with three straight 68s en route to a 204 tournament record to coast to a seven-shot winning margin.

The Hastings High and Hastings College graduate birdied four holes Sunday to earn \$4,000 of the \$38,480 purse.

WHITE CITES PUTTING

White mastered Lochland's huge and sloping greens with no three putts in 54 holes.

"I didn't have any three putts in three days and never missed a putt I should've made. Definitely, that was the key to my win," White analyzed. "A lot of people were having a lot of three putts — that was probably my biggest edge over the field."

White said putting the ball off his right foot and dipping the front part of the clubhead up, like Japanese pro Aosa Aoki, has produced a sound stroke.

"Probably the thing that's lost me more tournaments than anything is my putting. I changed my putting this winter and have been putting better than I ever have."

"I changed everything really. I just felt so comfortable out there," White added. "I could see the line and I could see the putter going straight back and straight through. I was reading the putts good — that's probably a home course advantage."

"It helps you quite a bit. There's a lot of subtle little things that you remember from playing it that you don't think about. They're in your subconscious — you just know where to hit shots."

White said overnight rains made the course play longer, which favored the heavy hitters.

"The fact we got to pick it and place it everywhere was really to the long hitters' advantage," he said. "I was really surprised that a couple of tee balls today were 30 or 40 yards short of where I hit yesterday. Certainly the softer conditions made the greens easier to hit to, but you were hitting longer clubs, so it probably evened out."

The White coasts to Midwest crown

Hastings native Jim White had a record-breaking homecoming with Sunday's victory in the 9th Annual Midwest Golf Classic.

The Council Bluffs professional toured Lochland Country Club with three straight 68s en route to a 204 tournament record to coast to a seven-shot winning margin.

The Hastings High and Hastings College graduate birdied four holes Sunday to score 64, 68 of the \$25,000 purse.

WHITE CITES PUTTING

White mastered Lochland's hogs and sloping greens with six three putts in 34 holes.

"I didn't have any three putts in three days and never missed a putt I should've made. Definitely that was the key to my win," White analyzed. "A lot of people were having a lot of three putts — that was probably my biggest edge over the field."

White said putting the ball off his right foot and slapping the front part of the clubhead up, like Japanese pro Anzo Aoki, has produced a sound strike.

"Probably the thing that's felt the most tournaments than anything is my putting. I changed my putting this winter and have been putting better than I ever have."

"I changed everything really. I just felt so comfortable out there," White added. "I could see the line and I could see the putter going straight back and straight through. I was reading the putts good — that's probably a home course advantage."

"It helps you quite a bit. There's a lot of subtle little things that you remember from playing it that you don't think about. They're in your subconscious — you just know where to hit shots."

White said overnight rains made the course play longer, which favored the heavy hitters.

"The fact we got to pick it and place it everywhere was really to the long hitters' advantage," he said. "I was really surprised that a couple of tee balls today were 30 or 40 yards short of where I hit yesterday. Certainly the softer conditions made the greens easier to hit to, but you were hitting longer clubs, so it probably worked out."

"Chipping was helped mainly because you could get it up," he added. "They've got two foot fringe and then rough. Particularly, you could bump it up from there. The fair greens I missed I got up and down for pars."

His biggest problem was adjusting to the general pace of play, which he described as too slow.

"You play in enough tournaments where people play slow, you have to learn to

establish your pace," he said. "I don't know why play was so slow — we played in a threesome and didn't have as many players on the golf course. We waited on every hole until the 18th hole — the first time we didn't have to wait to sit on the tee to hit our tee shots. That got to be kind of frustrating."

White said an aggressive attitude helped him continue to bag birdies.

White said winning in his hometown made victory especially satisfying.

"It was a very gratifying win," he said. "Certainly to do it in Hastings in front of a lot of people I've known for a long time was particularly gratifying. I always wanted to win here. I've finished second, third and fourth. I've gotten close a couple of times, but never have been able to pull it off."

White said the experience of winning the Midwest Golf Classic should pay off in future tournaments.

"I've been in a position to win tournaments like this before and something has always seemed to go wrong with my game and I haven't been able to get over the hump."

"This gives me a bit of confidence that I can win," he said. "Experience is really a great teacher — you have to be in contention a few times. This is probably as gratifying a win as anything I've done."

White will wrap down his summer schedule at the PGA Sectional Championship Aug. 31 and at the Nebraska Open in September.

HEMENEZ WINS AMATEUR FIGHT

Finishing second overall was Jeff Hemenez of Arlington, Texas, in the amateur division. He shot a three-under par 69 Sunday for a 208 total and earned \$350 in cash merchandise certificates.

Defeating pro champ Bob Stone of Independence, Mo., finished second among the pros. He shot four-under par 66 Sunday for a 211 total in the 36-hole tournament, sponsored by Coors and KOLN-HGHN TV.

Finishing third was Paul Purper of Phoenix, Ariz., with a four-under par 68 Sunday and a 211 total.

Tied for second in the amateur flight were Lincoln's Mark Matoss and Scott Howarter with 210 totals. Finishing fourth was Steve Gotsch of Great Bend, Kan., with a 210.

After heavy rain flooded the course, Lochland professional Steve Cox cut the field to the low 88 golfers for Sunday's play, which started at 11 a.m. instead of 7 a.m. Flighted amateurs were scheduled to play 36 holes while 36 additional pros and championship flight amateurs were out after Saturday's round.
